PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

SUBJECT: SUPPLEMENTAL FILING: SUBMISSION OF SELF-GENERATION INCENTIVE PROGRAM (SGIP) DATA PURSUANT TO DECISION (D.) 09-12-047

San Diego Gas and Electric Company (SDG&E) hereby resubmits for filing the SGIP data, as shown in Attachment A, in compliance with D.09-12-047.

PURPOSE

Ordering Paragraph (OP) 3(a) of D.09-12-047, dated December 17, 2009, requires SDG&E, in cooperation with the California Center for Sustainable Energy (CCSE), to file a Tier 2 advice letter containing the accounting data as of December 31, 2009 for all prior years for the SGIP. The decision provided the format of the accounting data to be submitted which includes details such as the authorized budgets, total costs spent, and any authorized carryover for each year of the program.

SDG&E is re-submitting the SGIP data at the request of the Energy Division to change the format of the report to show the "2006 solar supplement" as a negative number. This change will reduce SDG&E's "Total Authorized Budget", "Collected Carryover", and "Total Rate Payer Collections" inputs.

BACKGROUND

The Commission established the SGIP in 2001 to provide incentives to businesses and individuals who invest in distributed generation (DG), i.e., generation installed on the customer's side of the utility meter that provides electricity for a portion of or the customer's entire electric load. The program is administered by CCSE for SDG&E's service territory.¹

With the creation of the California Solar Initiative (CSI) in 2006, the Commission redirected the portion of the SGIP budget supporting solar incentives to the CSI program.² As a result, the SGIP budget was reduced from \$125 million to \$83 million per year for 2007 and 2008 to reflect that solar incentives are now funded through CSI.³ Also in 2006, Assembly Bill 2778 amended Pub. Util. Code § 379.6 to limit program eligibility for SGIP incentives to qualifying wind and fuel cell distributed generation technologies, beginning January 1, 2008 through January 1, 2012.

In D.09-01-013, the Commission approved the SGIP budget for 2009 but noted that further review was required of prior years' unspent SGIP authorized budgets, or "carryover funds," which had accrued over several years of SGIP operations. On June 1, 2009, the four utilities

filed detailed information on all unspent funds and pending SGIP applications, in compliance with (D.)09-01-013, to aid the Commission in a review of the program's budget status.

EFFECTIVE DATE

SDG&E believes this filing is subject to Energy Division disposition and should be classified as Tier 2 (effective after staff approval) pursuant to GO 96-B. SDG&E respectfully requests that this filing be approved effective April 4, 2010, 30 days from the date filed.

PROTEST

Anyone may protest this Advice Letter to the California Public Utilities Commission. The protest must state the grounds upon which it is based, including such items as financial and service impact, and should be submitted expeditiously. The protest must be made in writing and must be received within 20 days of the date this Advice Letter was filed with the Commission. There is no restriction on who may file a protest.
